RSABG botanist recognized for outstanding national scientific presentation

The American Society of Plant Taxonomists awarded Erin Tripp, an expert on wild petunias, their George R. Cooley Award for Best Contributed Paper in Plant Systematics at the society's annual meeting. During Ms. Tripp's presentation, entitled "Physacanthus (Acanthaceae): a heteroplasmic, intergeneric, interlineage hybrid?" she marshaled extensive morphological and genetic evidence to present what one award judge described as "the complete story" of a west African plant genus with previously uncertain evolutionary origins.

Ms. Tripp is a postdoctoral fellow at Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden in Claremont. She received her Ph.D. from Duke University in 2008 and has pub-

lished extensively on wild petunias and their relatives since 2006. Her co-authors on the paper include Lucinda McDade and Siti Fatimah Isa, both also of Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden, and Iain Darbyshire of Royal Botanic Gardens, Kew.

The award is named for George R. Cooley, a successful banker who studied plants and worked in conservation in retirement. Several plants bear his name, including *Justicia cooleyi*, a plant that just happens to be a close relative to the plants in Ms. Tripp's study. It is awarded to graduate students or early career researchers whose work is judged to be noteworthy as complete, synthetic, and original.

Strong team effort powers Pack past Huskies

The Claremont High School boys and girls varsity swim teams used South Hills as a tune-up for the upcoming Sierra League showdown against Damien and St. Lucy's this coming Wednesday.

Winning most of the day's events, the Wolfpack boys team triumphed over South Hills by a 114-55 margin and the Wolfpack girls team bested the Huskies, 115-57, in a solid showing during Wednesday's meet.

"We had a pretty nice day and it was a nice win coming off of spring break," said CHS coach Courtney Eads.

Dylan Tarazona was victorious in the 100-yard butterfly (5:09) and 500-yard freestyle (5:08.95) as the only multi individual event winner for CHS. Other first place winners for the boys team were Remy Ertaud (1:03.8, 100-yard backstroke), Luke Miller (2:15.05, 200-yard freestyle), Pedro Garcia (57.00, 100-yard freestyle) and Bryan Smith (25.01, 50-yard freestyle). The CHS boys 200-yard medley relay (1:51.20) and 400-yard freestyle (3:40.3) teams were also victorious.

"We treat every meet the same and even though South Hills wasn't the best team, we gave it 100 percent and didn't slack off," Ertaud said. "We have new coaches this year and everybody is getting faster and better. We're ready to take it to the next level and now the colleges can see what we have."

Noelle Tarazona continued her strong string of performances by winning both the 100-yard freestyle (54.32) and 100-yard breaststroke (1:10.13) races on Wednesday. Teammate Tana Wilson was also a multi-event winner for the girls team by taking first place in the 50-yard freestyle (26.00) and 500-yard freestyle (6:08.11) heats. Piper Moore (1:51.33, 200-yard freestyle) and Joy Gao (1:06.44, 100-yard backstroke) also won their respective races.

Like the boys teams, the girls 200-yard medley relay (1:59.9) and 400-yard freestyle relay (4:01.25) units were victorious against the Huskies. CHS junior Claire Gardenhire attributes her team's success to the direction of the swim program's current coaching staff of Coach Eads, head diving coach Amanda McCadden and assistant coaches Joy Simmons, Jaelyn
