## About the Paint Project

### Purpose:

Californians spend more than \$90 million annually managing leftover paint through Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection programs that are funded by ratepayers and taxpayers. One of the reasons there is so much leftover paint is because consumers simply don't know how much paint to buy in the first place.

The Be Paint Wi\$e Partnership is a collaboration between the counties of San Joaquin, Tehama, San Francisco, paint retailers in all three counties and the California Product Stewardship Council. Together, we're educating consumers how to buy the right amount of paint and reuse or recycle the rest.



### Goal:

Ultimately, the goal of this project is to apply the lessons learned from the pilot program to a statewide product stewardship system for paint, managed and funded by the paint industry.
