

FREE Expired Marine Flare Collection Events

Dispose of Your Expired or Unwanted Marine Flares Safely & Responsibly!

Single-use marine flares contain hazardous chemicals that pose risks to human health and the environment. Special collection events for unwanted flares are being held across California.

Open **ONLY** to recreational boaters or residents who live in or berth their boat in the covered participating areas (with noted residency requirement for West Contra Costa). Proof of residence or slip fee is required.

No commercial flares or other hazardous waste will be accepted!

***NOTE:** This event is **only** for West Contra Costa (WCC) residents or boaters in the following cities: El Cerrito, Hercules, Pinole, Richmond, and San Pablo, and unincorporated Contra Costa County (i.e., El Sobrante, North Richmond, Tara Hills, Rollingwood, East Richmond Heights, Bayview, Montalvin Manor). Boaters must prove WCC residency to participate.
