Dispose of Your Expired or Unwanted Marine Flares Safely & Responsibly!

Single-use marine flares contain hazardous chemicals that pose risks to human health and the environment. Special collection events for unwanted flares are being held across California.

Open <u>ONLY</u> to recreational boaters who live in or berth their boat in the covered participating areas (with noted <u>residency requirement</u> for <u>West Contra Costa</u>). Proof of residence or slip fee is <u>required</u>. No commercial flares or other hazardous waste will be accepted!
